- Exploring images of God.
- Appreciating the importance of St Ignatius and Ignatian spirituality.

- Examining the role of the Church in world.
- Exploring Catholic Social Teaching.
- Undertaking a Social Analysis.
- Recognising injustice at local, national and international levels.

- Developing an overview of the Bible.
- Accessing Scripture in an adult way.
- Reflecting on story in Scripture.

- Being challenged to be 'Good News' today.

- Drawing together the different strands of learning.
- Increased understanding of Ignatian spirituality.
- Developing the 'inward-outward' dynamic.
- Appreciating different types of prayer.
- Exploring concepts of conflict, power and freedom.
- Strengthening the desire to live faithfully.
